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Sequestration's Impact

What is Readiness and Why It Matters...

Readiness Reduces Risks

The United States military prides itself on always being ready to respond to the orders of the President. The requirements of what goes into "being ready" are determined by the senior leaders to ensure soldiers, sailors, airmen, and Marines receive necessary training and well-maintained equipment that enables them to succeed no matter the mission. **When readiness suffers, the risks to forces increase.**

To manage readiness, the department must balance the supply and demand of deployable forces around the world. The readiness of an individual unit is the result of a series of time-intensive programs that train qualified people and prepare working equipment to be deployed, operated, and ultimately recovered.

Our Current

Challenges

For nearly 12 years, the bulk of U.S. forces have been organized, manned, trained, and equipped to respond to the very specific requirements of the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. The focus on these wars left limited residual capacity and capability to respond to different kinds of threats, particularly those in other parts of the world. As the United States ended the war in Iraq and draws down in Afghanistan, the Department has planned, based on the 2012 Defense Strategic Guidance, to re-train the force for full spectrum military operations to meet challenges in the coming decades.

Sequestration Hurts

The automatic defense cuts, known as sequestration, went into

effect in March, 2013 after Congress was unable to reach a balanced approach to reducing the national deficit. In sequestration, Operation and Maintenance (O&M) accounts received disproportionate reductions. As a result, readiness activities suffered immediate and compounding impacts.

These cuts have damaged the Department of Defense's ability to maintain an acceptable level of force readiness, which directly impacts the morale of the force and threatens the military's ability to respond to emergency contingency operations.

What We Must Do

While the Services remain committed to protecting today's readiness for current operations, providing forces for unexpected conflicts is growing more difficult due to sequestration.

Should an emergent large-scale event occur during the current fiscal climate, the United States may not have enough ready forces to respond.

The U.S. military is building forces to fulfill two primary demands:

- Rotational presence: forces that can routinely operate away from the United States.
- Contingency availability: forces that are prepared to surge in crisis or counter an adversary that is escalating their activities.

Today, after 12 years of constant combat operations, the Services are facing serious shortages. Under sequestration-level funding the military cannot continue to operate at current levels and provide a fully-ready, globally responsive force in the manner that the American people have grown to expect from their military.

New ROTC Home Dedicated at UCF

At a patriotic-themed dedication on 8 November 2013, the University of Central Florida unveiled its newest building. Officially called "Classroom Building II," the building was constructed to provide large lecture hall style classrooms and a permanent home for the University's ROTC programs. Designed by Schenkel Shultz Architecture and constructed by Clancy & Theys Construction Company, the modern facility will be submitted for LEED silver certification by the U.S. Green Building Council.

The three-story 80,000 square facility is adjacent to Memory Mall in view of the Veteran's Commemorative Site and within walking distance of the Veteran's Academic Resource Center.

The building also features a 40-by-40-foot "Virtual Battlelab," built to support a wide array variety of task trainers and simulators and a "Heritage Hall" to showcase ROTC and military history and where students can find a quiet place to study.

A permanent home for the ROTC programs has been the vision of university leadership for a very long time. We are excited to leave our 'temporary' facilities after over a decade and are committed to sustaining a professional officer-training program that reflects the values of UCF and the Armed Forces.

The project also shows a commitment by the university to play a prominent role in develop-



ing leaders for the nation's armed forces. When interested students visit the ROTC programs at UCF, they will see a beautiful and modern facility centrally located on the main campus. Prospects will see that UCF not only develops new military leaders, but also actively honors their service and supports veterans transitioning to student life.

extremely high level. A vital asset to the USAF missions is the accomplishments of our Citizen Airmen, the **Air National Guard** and **Air Force Reserve**. The integrated capabilities of the Total Force are essential for the US defense strategy to succeed. Since the Cold War, the **National Guard and Reserve** have become a larger percentage of the Total Force and are essential partners in the wide range of military operations, from smaller-scale contingencies to major theater wars.

Air National Guard

When **Air National Guard** (ANG) units are not mobilized or under federal control, they report to the governor of their respective states, territory (Puerto Rico, Guam, Virgin Islands) or the commanding general of the District of Columbia National Guard.

Each of the 54 National Guard organizations is supervised by the adjutant general of the state or territory. Under state law, the ANG provides protection of life, property and Reserve peace, order and public safety. These missions are accomplished through emergency relief support during natural disasters such as floods, earthquakes and forest fires; search and rescue operations; support to civil defense authorities; maintenance of vital public services and counterdrug operations. There are more 108,000 Guard members and civilians in more than 88 flying wings and 175 geographically separated units.



Air Force Reserve

The Air Force Reserve (AFR)

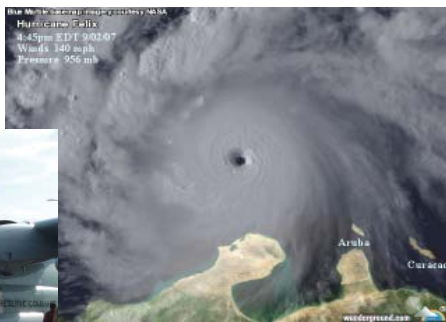

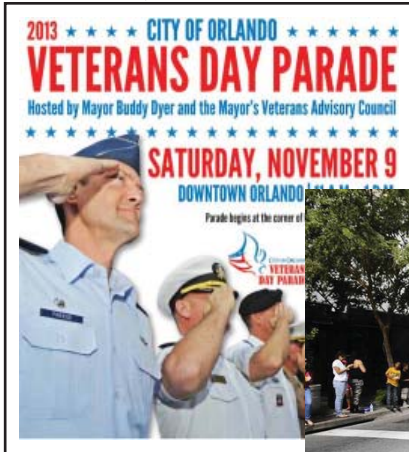
Over 100 Central Florida veteran's organizations and active military groups participated in the 13th annual Orlando Veteran's Day Parade on Saturday, November 9th.

The city of Orlando believes it is the largest Veteran's Day parade in the country.
